

As the prelude begins, the congregation is invited to be in an attitude of expectation for the worship of God.

Worship This wonderful

hymn tells, in poetic form, the story of Christmas. It bids us come to Bethlehem, tells of the angels and shepherds, and communicates the story of the incarnation. The text as used in this version was altered slightly in stanza 4 from 'born this happy morning' to 'born for our salvation,' to widen its use to the whole Christmas season. It was only 1947 that the author became conclusively known to be John Francis Wade (ca. 1710-1786). Through careful research Dom John Stephan identified the writer as an Englishman working in France, who copied and sold music of the Roman Catholic Church. This hymn was found in several copybooks located in Ireland and England. The watermarks found in one of these books establish it as written between 1720 and 1750.

We Hear the Word

In Christian tradition, this oracle is commonly regarded as a description of the messianic king to come. In its original context, however, it celebrated the coronation of a king of First Isaiah's day, probably Hezekiah. This may have been why Israel expected a messianic king. However, what they found was that Jesus came as a servant rather than a ruler.

The text of this hymn was written by Edmund H. Sears while he was pastor of a Unitarian church in Massachusetts. It was published in December of 1850 in the *Christian Register*. Since that time it has been considered a traditional Christmas carol.





We Sing

This carol, Joy to the World, was not originally written as a nativity hymn. Isaac Watts conceived of it as a Christ-centered interpretation of Psalm 98:4-9 ("Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth...for he is coming..."). The tune is a piecing together of phrases in Handel's Messiah (from "Lift up your heads" and "Comfort Ye"). Lowell Mason popularized it in this country and named it ANTIOCH after the town where Jesus' followers were first called Christians (Acts 11:26).

The story of *Silent* Night's origin is so familiar as to bear the marks of folk legend. Nonetheless, the account is well documented. Joseph Mohr, associate pastor of St. Nicholas Roman Catholic Church in the Austrian village of Oberndorf, composed it in 1818. It was first sung to guitar accompaniment as a duet by Mohr and the composer of the tune, Franz Gruber. The organ at the church was not functioning and it was composed to be sung with just guitar.





Kwanzaa

A Celebration of Family, Community & Culture by Elisa Vega-Burns

Kwanzaa is a unique African-American celebration with a focus on the traditional African values of family, community

responsibility, commerce, and self-improvement. Kwanzaa is neither political nor religious and, despite some misconceptions, is not a substitute for Christmas. It is simply a time for African-Americans to reaffirm and reinforce communitarian values and practices that strengthen and celebrate family, community and culture.

The word "Kwanzaa" comes from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means "first fruits of the harvest" in the African language, Swahili.

The "First Fruits" are celebrated as we uplift principles which support and strengthen family, community and culture. The NGUZO SABA (The Seven Principles) lifted up during Kwanzaa are UMOJA (Unity), KUJICHAGULIA (Self-Determination), UJIMA (Collective Work and Responsibility), UJAMAA (Cooperative Economics), NIA (Purpose), KUUMBA (Creativity), IMANI (Faith).

There is a traditionally established way of celebrating Kwanzaa. First, you should come to the celebration with a profound respect for its values, symbols and practices and do nothing to violate its integrity, beauty and expansive meaning. Secondly, you should not mix your Kwanzaa celebration or its symbols, values and practices with any other holiday or cultural celebrations. Thirdly, choose the best and most beautiful items to celebrate Kwanzaa. This means taking time to plan and select the most beautiful objects of art, colorful African cloth, fresh fruits and vegetables, etc. so that every object used represents African culture and your commitment to Kwanzaa in the best of ways.

During Kwanzaa, we light the MISHUMAA SABA (seven candles: one black, three red, and three green), which together represent the seven Kwanzaa principles. The black candle represents the first principle Umoja (Unity) and is placed in the center of the Kinara. The red candles represent the principles of Kujichagulia (Selfdetermination), Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics) and Kuumba (Creativity) and are placed to the left of the black candle. The green candles represent the principles of Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility), Nia (Purpose) and Imani (Faith) and are placed to the right of the black candle.

The black candle is lit first on the first day of Kwanzaa (December 26); the remaining candles are lit afterwards alternating from left to right on the following days (December 27 through January 1).

The last day of Kwanzaa is January I, the first day of the New Year. Historically this has been for African people a time of sober assessment of things done and things to do, and of self-reflection. Following in this tradition, this day of meditation is a time for us to ask ourselves and answer soberly and humbly the three Kawaida (Kwanzaa value system) questions: Who am I? Am I really who I say that I am? and, Am I all that I ought to be? Thus, it is a time to recommit ourselves to our highest ideals.

Since its founding in 1966 by Dr. Maulana Karenga, Kwanzaa has come to be observed by more than 18 million people worldwide. Join us for this rich cultural celebration, as together we commit ourselves to our highest ideals for 2009.

Do you Have a Need? Pastoral Care Ministers Available to Listen & Pray!

In his excellent book, *Can the Pastor Do it Alone*, Melvin Steinbron asserts emphatically that "there is no way we can build a staff large enough to put love with skin on for every one of our members if we continue to proceed in the traditional way."

One method by which God's love can be given concretely, specifically and continually to all of our members is through recruiting, training, and commissioning a sizable team of Pastoral Care Ministers.

At Resurrection we believe that building up the body of Christ in love is central to the purpose of the church. In order to facilitate this goal, 20 people have been trained and commissioned to care for our congregation.

At the conclusion of their training these ministers began developing flock care lists. The Pastoral Care Ministers are committed to praying regularly for the people on their flock list, to being available to helping or assisting them in appropriate ways, and to contacting the members of their flock regularly to encourage them.

The Pastoral Care Ministers officially began their ministry this month. They will begin to make contact with their flock list to make congregants aware of their availability. As our ministry grows the goal is to reach out to every person in our expanding community of faith. In the meantime, Pastoral Care Ministers are available to pray with and encourage anyone who would like to receive ministry. If you have not yet been contacted directly, but would like someone to talk or pray with you, please email or give us a call. Your prayers and support are greatly appreciated.
