The text of this hymn comes from the birth narratives told in Luke 2 & Matthew 2. The hymn is considered by many to

be one of the best of

the Christmas hymns. The text tells, in a well-organized and emotionally moving style, the story of angels, shepherds, and sages. The fourth stanza tells of the devout world looking toward Christ's

coming again.

Orginally titled

Nativity, Angels From the Realms of Glory, it was written by Scotsman James Montomery for publication in the 1816 Christmas Eve edition of his Sheffield Iris. It was not until the hymn appeared in his publication The

Christian Psalmist (1825), that it became universally popular.

We Prepare

There is some evidence to suggest that a form of the Advent Wreath first occurred in the Middle Ages; however, the first modern Advent wreath was made by Johann Hinrich Wichern (1808-1881), a German theologian and educator that founded a home for poor children in the city of Hamburg. During the Advent season, the children asked daily if Christmas had arrived. In 1839, he built a wooden ring (made out of a cartwheel) with 19 small red and 4 big white candles. A small candle was lit successively every day of Advent. On Sundays, a large white candle was lit. This eventually led to the modern Advent Wreath with its four candles. In 1860, people started to entwine the wooden ring with evergreen cuttings. The Advent wreath became a German Christmas tradition at the beginning of the 20th century. In Austria and Southern Germany (particularly Bavaria) it did not become a custom before 1930. It has now spread to other countries as well. Eventually, the Advent Wreath made its way into various Protestant churches and later into Roman Catholic churches in the United States.



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We Sing

During a year's sabbatical from his ministry at Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia, author Phillips Brooks (1835-1893) rode to Bethlehem on horseback for Christmas Eve 1865. As a year that had seen the end of the American Civil War and the assassination of an American President drew to a close, Brooks' longing for peace found expression as he pondered the "everlasting light" that had shone in Bethlehem's "dark streets."

Once believed to have been composed by Martin Luther, its origin, text and tune have been traced by modern research to the United States of the nineteenth century. Although the text is of unknown origin, the tune AWAY IN A MANGER was composed by James R. Murray (1842-1905). At one time he taught music in the public schools of Andover, Massachusetts. He later served as an editor for a publisher of sacred music.



Opening Essay

Unexpected Hope

With faith and hope John the Baptizer followed the promptings of the Holy Spirit, wherever those promptings might lead. The Holy Spirit's voice of hope took him to the desert and wilderness of Judea. He proclaimed the good news of better days and healed hearts and hope realized. John challenged people to take the corporate and individual actions to make hope a reality. Because of John's faithfulness, the beauty of hope blossomed in the desert. It was a hope that pointed forward to Jesus, the one who would ultimately reveal that even violence could be dismantled through fearless love.

John's message resonated with a people hungry for hope. As his popularity grew, government officials feared he was amassing too much power. So he was imprisoned. At that point, John the Baptist had some time to really look back on his life and look ahead to his future. Had his life really made a difference? Would real change ultimately result from all his preaching, teaching, baptizing and leading? Would hope ultimately win?

It is dicey to wrestle with such questions while behind bars.

Then came an unexpected hope: a message to John from Jesus: "The blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them." (Matthew 11:5)

At that point, John the Baptist knew that hope could not be confined. No, he could not break through the walls of that prison. Yet he could see beyond the walls to an eternal hope that was not limited by his circumstances.

Spiritual Maturity & Application

Monday's scripture from Hebrews 6: 13-19 challenges us to "seize the hope." Many people seem overwhelmed by a chronic, low-grade hopelessness. Adrift in a sea of busyness and pressure, they are looking for something to grab hold of--anything to keep them afloat.

What is your greatest source of hope? In what areas of your life are you most in need of hope? Hebrews speaks of hope as an "anchor of the soul." Reflect on that image. What other symbol or image would remind you of hope? Doodle or find a picture of that item, and hang it in a prominent place where you can see it and let it strengthen you. Or find an item (a small stone for example) and carry or display it as a symbol of hope.

Tuesday and Wednesdays readings from the Psalms speak to the promise of hope. Hope is a very important word in the Psalms. Psalm 65 describes creation's beauty and expresses the psalmist's conviction that God is "the hope of all the ends of the earth."

Some days when the newspaper tells us another sad story of a school shooting, injustice to the poor, or political corruption, it is difficult to feel that hope. An overload of bad news can numb our hearts.

As a way of remaining faithful to God's undying love for the world, take a story or issue from the world news and make it a focus of intercessory prayer for the day (or perhaps the week). Be a partner with God in hope as you pray. ~ *Spiritual Formation Bible*, 746, adapted.
